Name: Chalkhill blue butterfly

Lysandra coridon

UK status: Local (Shirt, 1987). Species of Conservation Concern

(formerly long-listed). Historic range decline now

apparently stabilising.

London status: Very rare and declining (3 sites).

Protected status: W&CA S5 (sale only)

Relevant London HAPs: Chalk grassland

Citation:

The chalkhill blue is confined to calcareous grassland in the south of the UK where its foodplant, horseshoe vetch Hippocrepis comosa is found. Although its range and abundance declined substantially with the historic decimation of its habitat, in the national context the butterfly now appears to have stabilised. Its dependence on a single foodplant and complex life-cycle involving larval tending by ants, leaves it highly vulnerable to habitat mismanagement. On London's restricted chalk downland, the chalkhill blue clings on in three sites only; at Farthing Downs and Riddlesdown in LB Croydon, and Saltbox Hill in LB Bromley (all SSSI and Metropolitan SINC). None of these may be described as a stronghold for the species, however.

Conservation priorities:

- Seek to stabilise and increase colonies in existing sites through balanced sympathetic habitat management
- Re-introductions as appropriate to widen regional distribution
- Protect any new colonies emerging from further survey
