UK status: UK BAP Priority. Nationally scarce. Edge of European

range. Declining.

## Citation:

This miniscule snail lives principally in permanently wet swamps, fens and marshes adjacent to slow-flowing calcareous rivers and lakes. It normally lives amongst sedge beds and wetland grasses, and at only 2.6 mm tall is easily overlooked. Although always localised, its national range has contracted significantly and it now occurs sporadically in a broad band across southern and eastern England, from Dorset and the Isle of Wight to Norfolk. In Greater London Desmoulin's whorl snail is well known in the corridor of the Rivers Frays and Colne, and occurs at both Denham



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Lock Wood and Fray's Farm Meadows in LB Hillingdon. These are both SSSI, within a Site of Metropolitan Importance for Nature Conservation and managed as nature reserves. Managing agencies; Hillingdon Borough Council, London Wildlife Trust, Environment Agency

Conservation priorities:

- Monitor and maintain known population [addresses UK SAP target T1]
- Protect and maintain any new populations emerging from further survey
