Citation:

This nationally rare damselfly has a stronghold in the Thames estuary and is locally abundant at several sites in the London Boroughs of Barking & Dagenham and Havering. Its current UK range is confined to parts of East Anglia and North Kent. Most known London colonies occur in well-vegetated, brackish ditches in grazingmarsh sites, for example at Rainham Marshes and in the Ingrebourne Valley (both SSSI). Although there have been major habitat losses on Barking levels, the damselfly still occurs at The Ripple Local Nature Reserve. A further site is the Mudlands Nature Reserve in Hornchurch. All sites have protection as Sites of Importance for nature conservation. - Monitor all known populations
