Statement

Citation:

The reed bunting declined substantially across its UK range during the 1970s and '80s, but is now apparently nationally stable. The decrease most likely affected birds that colonised marginal farmland habitats in the '60s, in parallel with several other UK BAP Priority species suffering impacts of agricultural intensification. Declines at wetland strongholds are likely to have had a more long-term effect on the species, and it is here that a renewed downturn in status is currently suspected, possibly due to habitat neglect. Wetland habitats support most of London's reed buntings and pairs may quickly colonise created wetlands even in inner boroughs. Important breeding concentrations are found at Rainham Marshes and the Ingrebourne Valley (LB Havering); the Lee and Colne Valleys, Beddington sewage works (LB Sutton) and the London Wetland Centre (LB Richmond).

- Reedbed maintenance and creation
- Wetland and Green Belt development control
- Farmland biodiversity conservation practices (sympathetic hedgerow management, headland creation etc.)
