Citation:

A tall perennial of riverside vegetation on damp, silty soils rich in nitrogen. It is moderately tolerant of brackish conditions and can grow near tidal river mouths. Its national distribution is concentrated in the Broads of East Anglia. Elsewhere however, and especially in the Thames Valley, urban development has caused a catastrophic decline in the plant. In Greater London one small population (6 plants in 2003) survives in a reedbed fringing the tidal Darent estuary near Crayford (LB Bexley). This population is highly vulnerable and has contracted, and may be threatened by leachate from an adjacent restored landfill site. [Note: the plant may have been lost to habitat destruction in 2005.]

Managing authority; Environment Agency



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Conservation priorities:

- Ensure favourable management of site as a matter of urgency
- Monitor population recovery
- Consider strategic reintroductions as necessary
- Protect any new populations emerging from further survey
