Citation:

A perennial of seasonally-flooded damp grassland, normally found in hay meadows and on riverbanks. The plant has a scattered national distribution and its known range has recently extended to East Yorkshire. However, it is threatened by even quite modest agricultural intensification and there have been regional losses. In Greater London the plant was rediscovered in 1984, in a flood meadow on the eastern bank of the Yeading Brook (LB Hillingdon). The population here appears fairly localised but is large and apparently stable (described as 'abundant' in 2005). The site is within a Metropolitan SINC and LNR. A reported second site in Hillingdon requires further confirmation.
